1. Purpose:

- 1.1. This procedure summarises standard club VHF operation and focuses on details applicable to Helensburgh Sailing Club usage
- 1.2. General: VHFs are "simplex" devices with a push-to-talk (PTT), release-to-listen principle. Most important: they are open for anyone to listen
- 1.3. Do not use them for general chit chat. Brief and to the point

2. Safety Use only

- 2.1. VHF radio communication is for Club activities only
- 2.2. The proper use of VHF channels at sea must be adhered to

3. Channels

- 3.1. **HSC operates on Private Channel M2/P4** . In the event this channel becomes blocked/unusable then: -
 - Channel 88 shall be used as backup channel 1 or
 - Channel 87 as backup channel 2
- 3.2. Agree with everyone in advance.
- 3.3. These channels have been generally recognised/agreed with QHM & Peelports (ClydePort).
- 3.4. Do NOT use Ch 12 (Clydeport Control), Ch 16 (safety channel), or Ch 73 (QHM).
- 3.5. Do not use Channel M/M1/37/37A as this is monitored by Rhu Marina

Note: Rhu Marina operates on Channel 80 but also monitors Channel M1

4. Call signs: -

- 4.1. These should be agreed/defined for the event and distributed at the initial briefing(s)
- 4.2. Club boats are normally: -
 - Champ
 - Blue Rib
 - Red Rib
 - Challenger Rib
 - SeaPro
 - Beach

5. Radio operation

- 5.1. To set up the radio for use
 - Switch on
 - Set volume high
 - Adjust "squelch" until the ...shshsh... noise just stops
 - Set power to low (about 1/2 mile line of sight range) use low power when possible
- 5.2. To call ...
 - Press and hold the transmit button

^{**} Icom radios: Channel P4 = M2

- Say (for example) "Blue Rib, Blue Rib, Blue Rib, this is Champ, Champ over".
- Release the transmit button.
- Wait at least 30 seconds before trying again if they don't reply.
- Increase power to high if longer range required

5.3. To reply ...

- o Press and hold transmit button
- o Say "Champ, this is Blue Rib over" then release the transmit button
- 5.4. General: Speak clearly & slowly be brief
- 5.5. Pro words and phrases ...

All after; Wait; All before; Repeat in figures; Repeat in letters; Out; Over; Say again; this is; I read back; I say again; Radio Check; All stations; Listen on channel; Received

- 5.6. Never use ... "over & out", "Wilco" or "Tally-ho"
- 5.7. Try to shield the radio in strong winds. Failure to do so may render your message unreadable due to wind noise.
- 5.8. And finally ... VHF is open to anyone with a radio to listen in. Please NEVER swear or use bad language

6. Special words/phrases:

- Mayday Distress: Ship or person is threatened by grave and imminent danger and requests immediate assistance.
- Pan-Pan Very urgent message to transmit concerning the safety of a ship or person.
- Securite (Say-cure-e-tay) Important navigational or meteorological warning.
- Seelonce Radio Silence imposed.
- Prudonce (Pru-donce) Radio Silence relaxed.
- Seelonce Finee Radio Silence finished.

7. VHF failure:

- 7.1. It is impossible to foresee the various circumstances of VHF failure. If this occurs a message must be relayed to the principle for the event senior person in charge, Principle Race officer, safety officer.
- 7.2. As generally HSC operate in a small area where boats, students or competitors are all in line of sight. Alternative communication may be by hand signals.
- 7.3. Mobile phones may be used but as these are generally not water resistance they are not regarded as appropriate for water borne activity.
